Day 1 May 19th to Istanbul

We all convened at the Green Roof Hotel in pleasant countryside fifteen minutes from Istanbul's shiny new(ish) airport. A walk down to a little river valley just before it got dark yielded European Bee-eaters, Olivaceous Warblers and Red-backed Shrikes. There were some lots of tongue orchids in the turf and Yellow Flag and Lax-flowered Orchid next to the wetland where some locals were collecting leeches!

Day 2 May 20th Van to Doğubayazıt

We were up early this morning, and by six were going through airport security, thankfully at this time of morning quiet so our progress through check-in and into the gate area was swift, though there were some bag shenanigans.

Our flight was on time and we were soon heading east, crossing more or less the length of Turkey, something that takes two hours in a plane. The weather was clear, so we watched the mix of mountains and plateau with interest until Lake Van's turquoise-blue waters hove into view. The

snow-rimmed crater of Nemrut Dağı marked the start of our descent and to the south we could see very well line after line of very snowy mountains, many of them topping 3500m. There were neat villages perched among grassy basins and occasionally along the shore of the lake itself. We passed over Akdamar Island before banking round in a semi-circle and following the shoreline into the airport. Our baggage soon arrived and then it was out to meet our driver Halil.

I picked up another car and then we were off, heading into the steppelands north of Van. It took us a while to shake ourselves free of the expanding city, but soon there was nothing but wide-open expanses and the occasional village and a seemingly out of place dual carriageway given the volume of traffic on it – not much! We drew to a halt to explore an area of dry steppe. *Iris barnumae* was in spectacular flower and we wandered through groups of these fabulous purple oncos photographing at will. *Bellevia longipes* had just its last flowers and there were *Muscari caucasicum* and *Gladiolus atroviolaceus* in bloom. We also found both *Muscari neglectum* and *Muscari botryoides*. *Silene arguta*,



Silene ampullaria and *Silene capitellata* were enjoyed and there were patches of blue flowered, red-purple-bracted *Salvia multicaulis* mixed with masses of yellow *Astragalus caraganae*. Ozan found us the weird shaggy *Bungea trifida* and there was *Lallemantia iberica* and *Ziziphora persica* to enjoy. All the time Black-headed Buntings and Corn Buntings moved past and there were Bee-eaters, Cuckoos, Spotted Flycatcher, Golden Oriole and Cetti's Warbler in the small copse of trees. Flocks of Rose-coloured Starlings had been passing and most were headed for one tree on this copse. There were Penduline Tits present too. A Long-legged Buzzard flew overhead. The lovely *maura* race of Stonechat was noted. Butterflies were excellent with Glanville Fritillaries, Queen-of-Spain Fritillary and plentiful Green-underside Blues as well as a few Common Blues and Mazarine Blues, and scarce

species such as the little Persian Skipper *Spialia phlomidis* and best of all the lovely Fatima's Blue. We photographed Anatolian Fiery Copper *Lycaena asabinus*. Moving back to the birds we could hear Quail and James flushed a European Nightjar. Across the road *Primula auriculata* bloomed in a damp gully with lots of *Dactylorhiza osmanica*. Here there were a few *Orchis pseudolaxiflora* blooming amongst Sea Arrow Grass and the lousewort *Pedicularis comosa* which was common. Black-headed Wagtails were common but with them was a *beema* race Yellow Wagtail too.

We reached the northeast corner of the lake and left its shores at Bendimahi, not having time to stop and birdwatch (we'd save that for a later day) and instead following the Bendimahi River valley up into the hills. We stopped for lunch at Muradiye Waterfall. Lunch was provided by a small cafe in a green grassy spot amongst poplars overlooking the waterfall, and was either fried trout or a meat dish 'saç kavurma', both of which were rated delicious, and some of us were so hungry after the early start and airline breakfast that we had to have more!

After lunch we drove upstream a kilometre and walked through a little almond and peach orchard to the river bank where we were by an incredible sight. The huge blooms of our second oncocyclis iris, *Iris iberica elegantissima*. Several hundred black-purple blooms were topped with almost luminous

white standards, these lightly edged in red. There was some variation, some particularly pale plants were noted, and also some with hints of yellow and others really quite dark, but all were exceptionally large. Below us Cetti's Warblers were in the riverside vegetation and we also saw Hobby, Common Terns, Kestrel and Lesser Kestrel and Syrian Woodpecker. There was a rich variety of plant life here with several *Astragalus* species, Bastard Toadflax, various *Euphorbias*, and the lovely prostrate *Astragalus halicacabus*,

the pale pink flowers turning into inflated almost peanut-like seedpods. *Muscari caucasicum* was common and *Prangos* and *Ferula* were growing up rapidly. Amongst the irises was a memorable plant of the wonderful *Phelypaea tournefortii*. The impressive scarlet flowers of this strange parasite, essentially a broomrape with one large bloom, are an incongruous sight!

Then it was up through Çaldıran and its wide open highland expanses and over the shoulder of Tendürek Dağı to the pass at almost 2650m. There were so many places along here that we could have stopped at, but it was time to get to the hotel. The views of Ararat were spectacular as we descended. We passed through Doğubayazıt with Ararat looming above us to the north and drive eastwards to our hotel, the Paraşut, really out in the middle of nowhere but with a superb view of Ararat and its little sister/brother, all of 4000m high to

its east. We parked up narrowly avoiding a fine plant of *Hyoscyamus reticulata* by the hotel steps and checked in.

After dinner I popped out into the steppe to see what was hopping and sure enough found some William's Jerboas bouncing around. And a Stone Marten too.

Day 3 May 21st

Ishak Paşa & the Sim-er Motel



After a varied and rather excellent breakfast we headed to the grounds of the hotel we used to stay at. The Sim-er Motel is sorely missed – it wasn't the most comfortable hotel in the area (the one we were staying in was certainly much nicer in that respect) but the Sim-er had wonderful grounds for birdwatching. The owner is rather keen on natural history and has planted plenty of trees and bushes, and as the surrounding area is entirely treeless this makes it a magnet for birds. Let's hope he re-opens in the future.

Migration was still moving along nicely. There were a couple of Marsh Warblers, a Chiffchaff or two, a couple of Garden Warblers and a goodly number of Spotted Flycatchers. Red-backed Shrikes were perhaps the most noticeable bird with a number of females, one nice male and a rather orange-coloured bird! Wood Pigeons flew out of the trees at regular intervals. Outside the grounds we could hear Bee-eaters and in the barren country outside we could see Isabelline Wheatears. A Hoopoe showed itself and there were a good number of Tree Sparrows. Butterflies included a Zephyr Blue. Earlier in the morning I had visited and in addition to the above had seen a male Levant Sparrowhawk and a Night Heron!

Next we headed for the Ishak Paşa Palace. The fortress sits high in the colourful multistrata-ed hills behind Doğubeyazıt, a quite fantastic location, and one which overlooks what was once part of the silk route, and today is once again a major trading route. We wandered the recently repaired fortress for a couple of hours, Ozan guiding us through the palace's history and significance.

We took our picnic above the Ishak Paşa joining several Turkish families doing the same. As we ate Common Rosefinch and Red-fronted Serins flew in to visit. High above the crags a pair of Imperial Eagles wheeled back and



forth, occasionally harassed by both Red-billed Chough and Lesser Kestrel! A little later a second-year Golden Eagle sailed over.



Next we walked steadily uphill to some very striking arid terrain. A highlight here was a population of hundreds of shining red *Tulipa juliae*. There were a few orange ones too but none of the yellow form we sometimes find here. There were some superb mounds of *Androsace villosa*, the pretty little *Silene dianthoides* and the strange sinuate-leaved *Matthiola anchoniifolia*, a plant that after nightfall emits a very pleasant scent. *Scilla monanthos* had mostly finished flowering but *Gagea bulbifera* was in fine form. *Allium akaka* too. Much more overpowering than the *Matthiola* was the 'pudding plant' *Anchonium elichrysifolium*,

looking rather like a very neat wallflower. There were banks of *Pedicularis comosa*, looking rather different from the wet meadow form seen yesterday. For some the most exciting plant was the 'vegetable sheep' *Gypsophila pulvinaris* which cloaked large rocks and cliffs in tight rock-like mounds up to a metre across. An extraordinary plant which just reaches into Turkey in this area. The tiny white flowers were well over, but it was the smooth hard mounds of green that impressed anyway. Also growing up here was *Draba polytricha*, *Coluteocarpus vesicaria*, *Bornmuellera cappadocica*, *Valeriana leucophaea* and a host of interesting *Astragalus* species including *bicolor*, *armeniacus*, *hyalolepis* and the prostrate *viridissimus*. Isabelline and Northern Wheatears were common and we also saw Finsch's Wheater. We saw a couple of Rock Buntings, and at least three Grey-necked Buntings. Red-billed

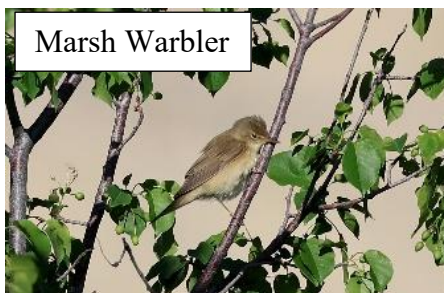

Chough coursed along the cliff tops and an Imperial Eagle land on a rocky pinnacle. We admired bushes of pink flowered *Onobrychis cornuta* by the roadside, finding Pfeiffer's Green Hairstreak fluttering about them. Large Wall Brwon was also seen. Caucasian Agamas were quite common, one chasing a Grey-necked Bunting off its perch. Blue Rock Thrushes sang from the cliffs, Richard found and photographed Eastern Rock Nuthatch, whereas I saw the pale eastern race of Western Rock Nuthatch! Woodlarks sang and a surprise was at least three Snowfinches. Back to the plants – *Bungea trifida* was in good form. *Lagotis stolonifera* flowered amidst all the astragalus, and on the high cliffs was a rather magnificent *Erysimum*. A final find was *Iris caucasica*.

We returned to the hotel. I popped out and found some Citrine Wagtails, Purple Heron and an immature Steppe Eagle. After dinner we headed out on a night drive which had lengthy periods of nothing but we did see some wonderful Dahl's Jirds chasing each other around a rock, these allowing us to get close for photography. At the same spot was a male European Nightjar. And we saw around six Red Foxes.

Day 4 May 22nd

Ararat: The Çilli Pass & Wetlands

Pre-breakfast several of us went to the Sim-er Motel again to see what was occurring... It was in truth rather quiet, but we did see a lot of Marsh Warblers and

Spotted Flycatchers. There were excellent views of a pair of Syrian Woodpeckers. We also saw at least two Eastern Olivaceous Warblers, a few Garden Warblers, a Hoopoe and Rock Sparrows. Best find was Martin's Booted Eagle.

After another great breakfast spread – this hotel does a very good breakfast – we stopped at a meadow on the edge of town where we could see the last remnants of *Muscari coeleste*, an unusual pale sky-blue grape hyacinth with 'open' flowers. Black-headed Yellow Wagtails were plentiful. Salty steppe here had much *Lepidium cartilagineum* blooming. Two Hoopoes pretty much ignored us as they raised the crests at one another.

Then we drove out across wide open landscapes, passing some very rustic villages, to an area of old lava hills that descend from Ararat western slopes. We stopped by one village and looked at the wetland there. Caucasian Agamas posed on the rocky slope below our viewpoint. Further out there were several Purple Herons, Grey Herons and Squacco Herons and beyond the reeds some White Storks. Wildfowl were represented by Mallard, Garganey, a few Ruddy Shelduck, and several Red-crested Pochard. There were lots of White-winged Black Terns, and a number of Marsh Harriers.

Our main site was by the lava hills on Ararat's slope. Here there were several highlights. Perhaps the most interesting one was the strange ant-soil-plant relationship we spotted. These were patches of *Nepeta meyeri*. But nothing growing with them – they all seemed to be in the middle of ant nests! Each was certainly surrounded only by soil. We later learnt that this plant exhibits strong allelopathy – it releases no less than ten allelochemicals that inhibit/stop other plants from growing/germinating. There's no doubt that it is extremely effective from what we saw as there was not a sign of green within 50cm of the *Nepeta meyeri* colonies. Apparently there's much research into this particular plant....

The birding proved rather good too. There were numbers of wheatears. Mostly Finsch's and Isabelline, but also at least one pair of Black-eared Wheatears, the male in a very striking black and white livery. Bee-eaters were noted above the pumice quarry, so too Blue Rock Thrush. Here we enjoyed picking up rocks that seemed light as air! Several Upcher's Warblers were well-watched and eventually we found the birding highlight of the morning, a superb male White-throated Robin. There were quite a few perfect *Iris iberica* ssp *elegantissima* in excellent morning light on the grassy north-facing slopes of the lava mounds. There were many other flowers too with deep purple

Gladiolus atrovioleaceus, weirdly-coloured *Verbascum phoeniceum* and lots of pretty *Minuartia juniperina* draped over rocks. Also *Cerinthe major* ssp *auriculata*, the blue bells of *Campanula stevenii* and some

pristine deep red-brown *Orchis coriophora*. We saw butterflies too. There were several Queen-of-Spain Fritillaries, a Mallow Skipper, Small Coppers, several Berger's Clouded Yellows, and a few Cardinals too. Then it was back to the minibus for another fine picnic spread...it had been a lovely experience to wander such an unusual and unspoilt landscape for the morning with no-one about other than one shepherd who passed us with his tight-knit flock of sheep.

After such an enjoyable repast we just had to go and enjoy an afternoon along the shores of the wetlands that line the foot of Ararat. Wide open landscapes occasionally interrupted by very rustic villages and a rich assortment of wildlife was the order of the day. A big surprise was a large old male Wild Boar standing in the marsh! An even bigger surprise was the Sooty Orange-tip that Hilary photographed. Of course there were all sorts of birds. We saw all three species of marsh terns – Black, Whiskered and White-winged Black. There were two groups of three Spoonbills. A Glossy Ibis and a bunch of Squacco Herons too. Turkestan Short-toed Larks were well-watched. Waders included two Spur-winged Plovers, 3 Avocets, a Curlew Sandpiper, Green and Wood Sandpipers, several Ruff, a Little Stint and plentiful Black-winged Stilts. We enjoyed the villages too with their turf-roofed stone walled houses, and piles of drying cow dung forming neat walls. We found a Strauch's Racerunner and amongst the plants were lots of *Eremostachys laciniata* and swathes of the strange *Lepidium vesicarium*.



Day 5 May 23rd

Volcanos and wetlands

Early morning saw me out and about in the wetlands in the valley below Ararat. Briefest of highlights – Bearded Tits, Paddyfield Warblers, Gull-billed Tern, Reed Buntings, and extraordinarily, a flock of 7 *rossicus* race Bean Geese flying across the face of Ararat!

It was another sunny morning but by the time we'd finished breakfast it was already a little hazy though the weather remained bright and often sunny all day. Ararat shone icily at us as we said goodbye to the kind hotel staff and set off for Lake Van.



We stopped by some lovely meadows. These were quite wet! There was an abundance of the marsh orchid *Dactylorhiza umbrosa* here and with them lots of *Primula algida*. This lovely little pink primrose is rather like the Scottish Primrose. There was also some rather small *Primula auriculata* alongside the streams. Adding blue to the display was an abundance of dark navy *Bellevia paradoxa*. Much paler were blue *Muscari armeniacum*. There was white too in the shape of a large flowered *Cerastium*. These meadows were cut by volcanic ribs – I think from lava flows – and these had a completely different vegetation contrasting nicely with the lush meadows. Here was *Salvia pocalata*, *Scutellaria orientalis*, some tiny *Ranunculus arvensis*, *Nonea pulla*, *Onosma araraticum* and *Silene capitellata*. *Bellevia fominii* flowered well on the lava with some nice clumps of *Campanula stevenii*. All the while Black-headed Wagtails fluttered about and there was at least one pair of Citrine Wagtails here. Redshanks and Lapwings called.

Twice Crimson-winged Finches flew past. A final treat was the lovely little Mousetail *Myosurus minimus*.

We followed the river downstream until it reached Lake Van at Bendimahi and drove down a track to the lakeshore where we had an hour's birdwatching before the picnic. This started with some very tall *Orchis palustris* growing in the damp vegetation that also included a lot of *Glaux maritima*. Down by the shore were literally thousands of Armenian Gulls. We felt sure that there must be other gulls present but a search through the ridiculous numbers yielded only a single Lesser Black-backed Gull! There were though some Ruddy Shelduck, a few Common Shelduck, a number of Black-winged Stilts, some Ruff, and a Spoonbill. Spur-winged Plovers sat side by side with Lapwings. Turkestan Short-toed Larks song-flighted around us. Over to one side there were at least eighty Greater Flamingos. Cattle Egrets and flocks of Glossy Ibis accompanied the start of our picnic, a Bearded Tit, the end.

We continued to remote Göldüzü, a rustic village on the edge of Arın Gölü. This lake is an even more amazing colour than Van Gölü, being bright turquoise in more or less any weather. The snowy

4058m volcano of Suphan Dağı reared above us to the north. Cascading down its lower slopes were great masses of lava that reached close to Arın Gölü. Presumably this dormant (there are mud hot springs on the top) volcano is the reason for the high soda content of Arın Gölü? Unfortunately though the little lake's extremely low level meant there were few birds so we departed right away.

Moving on we stopped in some poplar planted meadows in Adilcevaz. These held an impressive population of *Dactylorhiza umbrosa*, looking rather different from the form we'd seen at high levels in Çaldıran in the morning, here tall and leafy, and very variable in colour, ranging from dark magenta to white, with the latter predominating. Bogbean was also here, some of it in flower. There were plenty of Olivaceous Warblers in the trees and we noted Blackcap, Syrian Woodpecker and Hoopoe.

Day 6 May 24th

Nemrut Dağı

After breakfast we spent the entire day up inside the crater of the Nemrut Dağı volcano. Once we reached the crater rim we stopped and admired the view down into the caldera. Some two-hundred and fifty thousand years ago this volcano changed the landscape of the region by sending an eighty kilometre long river of lava southwestwards, thereby blocking the drainage of what would have been the upper tributaries of the Tigris. This led to the formation of huge Lake Van, which this morning lay gleaming in the sunlight below us. Looking back inside the crater we could see the marvellous deep blue crater lake that fills a quarter of the caldera, the caldera walls made of cliffs and screes liberally sprinkled with birch and aspen forests and streaked with snow. Nearer at hand lay obsidian and lava strewn hollows and slopes.

We drove down to the boulder fields at the bottom of the caldera and spent the morning exploring the rock gardens within. It was *Euphorbia denticulata*, named for the delicately fimbriate red-black shiny glands in the flowers, that first took the interest. Next was *Iris caucasica* which became more prolific as we walked down the slope, joined by bunches of *Onosma bracteatum* and patches of yellow *Linum triflorum*. Dalmatian Ringlets flew back and forth. We found a lovely patch of *Globularia*



trichosantha and below this we encountered our first fritillaries. These were *Fritillaria assyriaca* with its narrow glaucous leaves and narrow unflared bells. *Fritillaria minuta* we found but its flowers were over. The latter lives by melting snow whilst *assyriaca* is found on the drier slopes abutting these, though often they were literally right next to each other. Perhaps not surprisingly there were hybrids, exhibiting various intermediate features, and we did manage to find some of these still in flower. Woodlarks sang throughout along with Skylarks too. Chukar were quite common and this year there seemed a Grey Partridge around every corner, this is normally a much less commonly seen species anywhere in Turkey. We found lovely *Corydalis oppositifolia* subspecies *rutifolia* in shaded areas and near these the strange 'Nemrut Dağı' form of *Puschkinia scilloides*, its flowers staying in a partially opened state and the whole plant much taller with long upright hooded leaves. This form is so different that we wonder why it hasn't been given a proper name yet. The last *Gagea luteoides* was found and *Arabis caucasica* and *Solenanthus stamineus* flowered well amongst the rocks which also held a small population of *Saxifraga sibirica*. One huge Spur-thighed Tortoise was found, and everywhere there were Valentin's Lizards, the males looking very smart with their green marbled backs and blue-eyed flanks. Queen-of-Spain Fritillaries were often very small at this altitude. There were a number of Sooty Coppers, a Yellow-banded Skipper, a superb orange and yellow Eastern Orange-tip and some Green-underside Blues. Back to the birds - Ortolan Buntings were seen, so too Rock Buntings, whilst near the vehicles James spotted three Snowfinches. The biggest surprise of the morning was an Ibex, a young male, flushed by Austin. Cape Hare and Souslik were also noted.

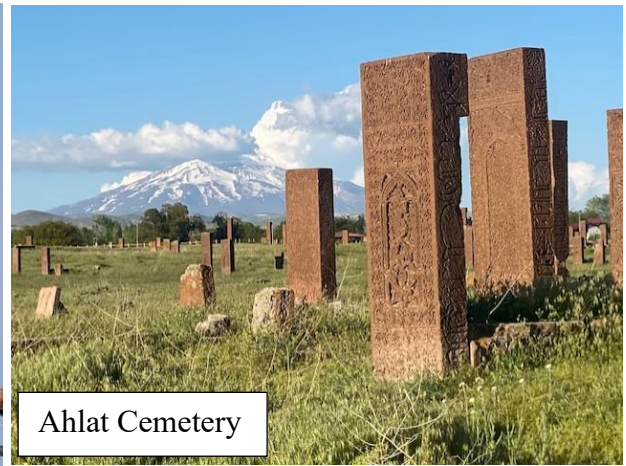
We returned to the minibuses and set off down to the crater lake. We explored this beautiful spot as Halil and Ozan readied the picnic. Inland of us were herby grassy low rolling hills. Lake side dropped steeply through a rocky Aspen wood. Under these small trees were a few *Dactylorhiza flavescens*, the Georgian Orchid, and just a few pink *Orchis pinetorum*. There were *Geraniums*, tall *Ranunculus kotschyii* and lots of irises including large clumps on the steep ground. A Ring Ouzel was seen briefly in the Aspens. This has to be one of the most stunning picnic locations in a tour with several picnic spots that are top-drawer.

In the afternoon we headed out of the east side of the volcano rim. En route we found a population of *Pulsatilla albana* in fine condition, showering a slope with the furry purple blooms. With them were lots of *Alyssum* and *Bornmuellera cappadocica* whilst *Gagea uliginosa* grew on damp mossy areas. *Ranunculus crateris* and *Ranunculus dissectus* were two rather fine buttercups.

We dropped down to Ahlat stopping at the amazing Seljuk Cemetery there. Ozan gave us a little introduction to this huge site and we were left to wander for half an hour amongst the vast number of often intricately inscribed gravestones emerging from the steppe. Needless to say there were many steppe flowers here including lots of *Anchusa leptophylla* and the lovely orange-lined *Onobrychis atropatana*. Hobby flew over.

Day 7 May 25th

Bitlis Circuit

An early morning birding trip featured a nice selection of birds and interestingly a Yellow-legged Tortoiseshell.

Soon we found the back road that took us into the green hills and mountains south of Van. We stopped a couple of times in a wide flat valley, the meadows carpeted in buttercups – *Ranunculus kotschyii* – and with patches of *Dactylorhiza umbrosa*. Corn Buntings and Black-headed Yellow Wagtails were everywhere. A nice roadside waterfall cascaded into a marsh where we watched Marsh Warblers, Sedge Warblers and Common Sandpiper. The river waters were full of the water crowfoot *Ranunculus sphaerospermus* and in wet patches grew *Oenanthe sophiae* and *Cardamine tenera*. A Dipper flew past.

We descended into a rocky gorge and spent a happy hour enjoying the flora and fauna there. Above the road was a magnificent clumps of *Iris sari* in flower, very large and tall specimens. Along the base of the hillside here we saw *Lamium gargaricum*, poppies and various legumes which made it a very flowery place. Here we saw our first *Gundelia tournefortii*, a striking thistle that dries into a tumbleweed later in the year. The Large-flowered Venus's Looking Glass *Legousia pentagyna* put on quite a show. We soon started to notice the diversity of clovers here including lots of *nigrescens*, *campestre*, *phleoides* and the lovely *pauciflorum*, the latter's unassuming little red blooms turn into furry balls when in fruit. Rose-coloured Starlings were on top of the ridge, with Blue Rock Thrush and Rock Buntings which sang all the while. The chestnut-leaved Oak *Quercus libani* dominated the hillside and it seemed it

was mixed with *Quercus brantii* with a bewildering range of hybrids. This proved a good spot for butterflies. Two Eastern Festoons sailed back and forth across a roadside gully and a Scarce Swallowtail sailed over. There was a glittering Anatolian Fiery Copper, Glanville Fritillary and a 'citrus' Eastern Orange-tip. A Dwarf Snake (sp) escaped without a photo.

We passed through a couple of very rural villages and stopped by a colourful roadside bank. Here was the stunning *Campanula reuterana* a most lovely bellflower with deep purple centres and paler blue-purple outers. *Anchusa aucheri* grew on the shaley banks. The lovely *Rosa foetida* with large yellow rose blooms was much enjoyed.

We spent an hour exploring a grassy valley amongst the (scrub) oak woodland whilst our picnic was prepared. This was a wonderful place with a small stream filled with watercress gentling descending through willows and hawthorns. Many butterflies were visiting the cress. There were Small Coppers, Sooty Coppers and Mazarine Blues. We found two Blue Argus mating, though sadly they met an untimely end when they fell into the stream! A superb Silver-washed Fritillary was well-

photographed and there was also a shimmering pale orange-gold Turkish Golden Copper.

We found orchids – some *Dactylorhiza umbrosa* and a few *Dactylorhiza flavescens* in good flower. A big surprise was a small population of the unusual yellow, brown and green *Orchis punctulata*. These were in fabulous condition and well worth the scramble up to them! Lizards, especially Balkan Green Lizards, were common and continually rustling in the undergrowth. There was a Spur-thighed Tortoise or two and we found the skull of a Wild Boar. The lovely *Cerastium armeniacum* showered the dry hillsides in white blooms. As we ate the delicious picnic – complete with Turkish delight! A Common Buzzard soared over.

Our last stop of the day was at the lowest altitude we would reach on the entire trip at around 1400m above sea level! Here the dry slopes held a nicely varied steppe flora. The lovely peachy-red flowered *Salvia trichoclada* was mostly across the river. On the near side was *Onosma albo-roseum* and

Campanula involucrata. We found some more Eastern Steppe Festoons and also two of their close relative the lovely little *Archon apollinarius* otherwise known as Little False Apollo. Southern White Admiral flew back and forth, Fritillaries included Algerian Fritillary and there was a whole bunch of skippers including Olive, Dingy and Persian. A European Swallowtail flew over. We spotted a Pied Wheatear and there were Red-rumped Swallows by the bridge. Meanwhile Gillian had found the

rare *Gladiolus antakiensis*. On the far bank there were wild pear trees and an impressive clover which appears to be *Trifolium dasyurum*. There was a magnificent show of *Aethionema grandiflorum* on the shaley slopes. Also noted here was *Smyrnum cordifolium* and the large white-headed *Allium* maybe *multibulbosum*.

Day 8 May 26th

South Lake Van

After breakfast we departed at nine and headed for a tiny village near Tatvan. Our prime target here were peonies and though we found them they were not in flower. The scrubby oak – *Quercus petraea* – was a delight, if rather difficult to wander in! The light shone through the fresh bright green foliage to the accompaniment of loud Nightingale and Golden Oriole songs. In the understory we found many Greater Butterfly Orchids in perfect flower, the subspecies here with decidedly greenish



blooms. A Roller was holding territory by some sand banks and we also saw Red-backed Shrikes, Rock Sparrows, Common Whitethroat and heard a Willow Warbler singing!

Next we headed to a pleasant little area on the shore of the lake a few kilometres away. We spent a happy hour and a half here. The light shone through the fresh bright green foliage of *Quercus petraea* (as well as Aspen, *Acer platanoides* and several *Crataegus* and *Sorbus* species) again to the accompaniment of loud Nightingale and Golden Oriole songs. Overhead first a light phase then a dark phase Booted Eagle appeared, the latter giving superb views. In the understory we found the lovely large-flowered *Cephalanthera kotschyana* in fine bloom and Andy soon found some nice *Orchis* (*Neotinea*) *tridentata*. The white *Symphytum kurdicum* was a nice find. Balkan Green Lizards scurried away and there were a number of Spur-thighed Tortoises on the

hillside. Further up we found more open ground. Here was our prize, the spectacular Komper's Orchid. First there was one, then a majestic group of three in perfect flower. We went on to find around 250 of these fine orchids, nearly all in perfect bloom. A surprise was *Ophrys reinholdii* and a further surprise were all the remaining bee orchids were *Ophrys staussii*. Other plants noted here were *Euonymus latifolia*, *Cotoneaster nummularia*, *Centaurea nigrifimbriata*, and the triumvirate of *Aethionemas* – *speciosum*, *grandiflorum* and *membraneceum*. Glanville Fritillary was numerous. At least

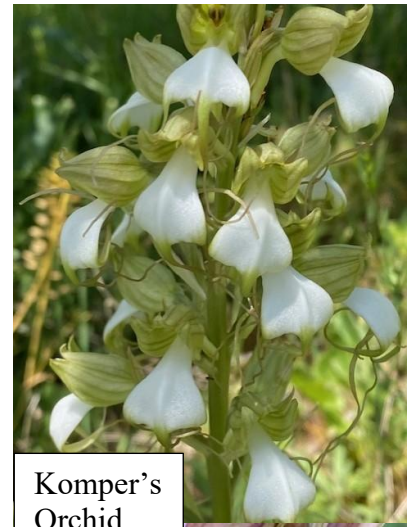

two impressively large orange Greek Clouded Yellows were enjoyed and there was an immaculate Cardinal too.

We drove along the southern shore of the lake passing through plentiful low oak woodland, meadows and steppe, a pleasing landscape and one with a rich diversity of plants. We stopped to make lunch by a river and whilst Ozan and Halil got it ready we wandered along tracks up into the oak. There were many species of buttercup here, I think we counted eight? Most impressive were the displays of the tall *fenzlii* and one little stand of the even bigger *sericeous*, as well as elegant silvery-leaved *diversifolius*. There were all sorts of umbels, *Aethionemas* and *Boraginaceae*. The thistle *Gundelia tournefortii* was dominant on the dry slopes above with some nice *Cynoglossum vanense*. Rock Buntings sang up there.

We now reached the top of the Kizkunkiran Pass. This is a relatively low pass at just over 2000m. The security on the pass top kindly allowed us to drive our minibuses up the side track and so we could get straight out and look at the community of plants growing on the damp north-facing slope. Little *Fritillaria minuta* was well over this year but there were some patches of *Globularia trichosantha*. We found the buttercups *Ranunculus vanensis* and *Ranunculus bulbiferus* which are, in

Turkey, known only from this site (the latter is found in Iran and Iraq too), and both are rather cute little snowmelt species. There was also *Ranunculus cuneatus* and *Prunus prostrata*. There were decent views of both Rock Sparrows and Ortolan Buntings, also a White-throated Robin.

Our last stop of the day was by the wetland at Gevaş. Here the birders headed along the shore and the sand bar that separates a lagoon from the main lake. Most exciting were the White-headed Duck. We counted seven of these characterful birds, mostly males. There were also a few Shoveler, Common Pochard, Red-crested Pochard and a single male Eurasian Wigeon. Moustached Warblers and Bearded Tits were in the reeds. Black-necked Grebes offshore. There were also at least seven Slender-billed Gulls and a Mediterranean Gull. Suddenly a Golden Jackal was spotted watching us before it slunk rapidly away. Then a dead Transcaucasian Water Shrew. Meanwhile those of a more botanical bent were exploring some fallow fields behind the marsh. Here they found some superb shows of orchids and both *Gladiolus atroviolaceus* and *Gladiolus kotschyianus* amongst a host of colourful ruderal species that included *Glaucium grandiflorum* and *Consolida orientalis*. Then it was on to Van and the

exceedingly nice Doubletree by Hilton Hotel.

Day 9 May 27th Akdamar Island, Van Museum & Van Kalesi

We departed as usual at nine and headed south and then west along the shore to the little ferry terminal and heading out to the island. This is always a most pleasurable experience as the boat chugs across the turquoise water the fabulous views of the mountains south of the lake opens up. Jackdaws were a constant companion to the boat, but as we started to circle the island the birdwatching went up a notch or two. There is a large breeding colony of Armenian Gulls on the island and many Rock Doves too. A few Night Herons sat in trees or flew about, and there were abundant Alpine Swifts and several Lesser Kestrels in the air above us. Landing, we all went up to the newly restored church, a Little Owl welcoming us en route. The superb relief carvings had been repaired slightly, but were basically unchanged. Showing major scenes from the old testament (Jonah and the whale, David and Goliath, etc), plus the founding bishops. Nevertheless, the main emphasis was on the local fauna (fish, birds, goats, deer, rabbits, etc) and flora, including a frieze of grape vines. Inside, the frescoes had been slightly brightened and the damaged plaster repaired. The whole has now been weatherproofed, with new windows, retiling of the roof and protection of the exterior against erosion. Then we split up and wandered around the island. Anyone going near the abundant nests of the Armenian Gulls were given a good hard laughing for their pains. There were a few Olivaceous Warblers in the *Celtis* trees and in some shore-side willows I found an Upcher's Warbler and a Chiffchaff. Plantwise the abundant rabbits seemed to have eaten most of the vegetation but we did see some nice big architectural *Smyrniun cordifolium*. A very old *Pistachia vera* was appreciated.

Back on the 'mainland' we went to the excellent restaurant by the boat landing at Akdamar where we were treated to a fine lunch of Van's endemic Mullet or 'et sote' served in sizzling dishes, this made of little pieces of various vegetables and lamb, both served with rice and salad – excellent!

In the afternoon we headed back to Van and the Van Museum. What a marvellous museum this is. It took us through the whole history of human settlement in the region. Which is to say several



thousand years. There were wonderful diaramas of life through these periods and a huge collection of artefacts from the different periods.

Then it was to Van Castle. Ozan showed us around. He took us to see some cuneiform inscriptions announcing kingly things about the place and then we walked uphill to see a burial chamber outside of which was a cliff face covered in the cuneiform writings. Up above he showed us a flat area, a kind of temple, where drainage grooves were well-marked in the rock, one to drain sheep's blood, the other, cow's blood. We looked out over the old Urartian settlement now visible just as foundations. Mosques out there were from the Ottoman period and nearer at hand was an archway from the Seljuck period. We learnt that in fact it was the Assyrians who had built the castle in the first place, and that they had been usurped by the Urartians at a later date. Up on the rocks of the castle were *Zygophyllum fabago*, *Lycium ruthenicum*, and some great plants of the showy but spiny knapweed *Centaurea urvillei*. Alpine Swifts, Lesser Kestrels

and Red-billed Chough overflew the castle.

Day 10

May 28th

After breakfast we set off for the high ridges of mountains that line the south shore of Lake Van. We headed up through very rustic Kurdish villages on a good asphalt road. Soon the mountains close to the road became snow-streaked and then patches of snow appeared by the roadside. This road takes us up over a very high pass, 3000m, and so by the time we reached the top part there was a lot of snow around us. We stopped by a clear area, speckled with the pale blue of *Puschkinias*. There were very many of them, tens of thousands. And not just one species. The 'real' *Puschkinia scilloides* showered a pale green slope with blue, but there were also paler ice-blue plants, even more abundant, some along the road edge and many out further. These have only recently been given a name - *Puschkinia bilginii*. *Gagea luteoides* was common and there were good populations of *Fritillaria minuta* and *Corydalis oppositifolia* too. There were drifts of pink *Primula auriculata* and the little mouse-tail buttercup *Ranunculus myosuroides*

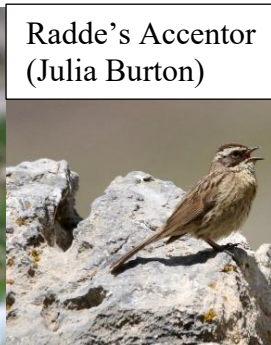
shone in the sun. A couple of *Merendera kurdica* were found growing in a stream, one particularly fine specimen causing Gillian to a loud exclamation of delight! In the stream were Banded Frogs and lots of Green Toads. Most got a good look at a Radde's Accentors, and Northern Wheatears were common. Linnets and Twite too. Both Red-billed and Alpine Choughs flew over. On the rocks above the snow was the lovely *Saxifraga kotschyii*. Large-flowered *Ranunculus polunini* was in good form. On the low ridges towards an imposing cirque was the lovely golden *Fritillaria minima*, a great rarity known from only a few locations in the world. It was here in some abundance, a stunning sight. Two Alpine Accentors and several Shorelarks were seen too. Two Griffon Vultures sailed over the mountains.

We headed up over the pass not stopping for the continuing show of *Puschkinias* as we went. Around was a fabulous snowscape, interrupted by a few areas of gravel and turf and by the great cliffs that reared up at the back of the main cirque to our left. We crested the pass, and continued down the far side, the size of the scenery in all directions impressive. We stopped by a cliff, hoping for Wallcreeper. None were forthcoming but we did see a number of Chukar, Rock Sparrows and a very nice surprise a superb Persian Wheatear.

Our lunch spot was spectacular in all respects. A little roadside knoll had magnificent views down the valley towards Bahçesaray and all round to high snow-streaked peaks. There was a high level of

verticality at this spot! As the picnic was set out we explored the little ridge below and found one of the floweriest spots imaginable. There were some wonderful specimens of pink *Tulipa humilis* though the goblets of red *Tulipa armena* were recently finished. There were some fine *Fritillaria kurdica* about too, with groups of them particularly prolific on an area of limestone pavement

where their vari-coloured green (almost pure in one or two) or more commonly dark red brown tessellated bells were shown off to wonderful effect. There were also lovely clumps of *Iris caucasica* with many flowers in bloom. *Eremurus spectabilis* would clearly

shower the rocky slope with its yellow wands in a week or two. There was the usual suite of alpine buttercups, which is to say four species, but here we saw the unusual *Ranunculus polunini* in bloom. Back on the top of the ridge was the architectural *Rindera ceasptiosa*, the white *Linum tenuifolium* and *Ornithogalum luschanii*. The wonderfully fragrant *Anchonium elichrysifolium* regaled us with its puddingness. Rock Thrushes, Black Redstarts and various wheatears were seen. A quick explore downslope revealed that there was indeed much *Iris aucheri* down there though this year it had already finished flowering.

Returning over the pass we spent a happy hour or so exploring the slopes near where we'd been in the morning. The ridges in particular proved amazing here.

The populations of *Fritillaria kurdica* were quite special and so too some lovely *Pulsatilla albana*. Perhaps the finest plant was the lovely cushion 'thlaspi' *Noccaea sintenisii*. The lilac blooms formed little androsace-like cushions so

smothered in blooms that no leaves were visible. Also here was the

dalek-like *Jurinella moschus*.

Day 11 May 29th

Early morning birdwatching this morning saw Richard down at the marshes opposite the hotel where he saw a good number of White-headed Duck.

After breakfast we headed out along the road towards Başkale from the southeast corner of Lake Van. The day once again was bright and sunny and today was exceptionally clear with the snowy peaks standing out very clear above the turquoise waters. Our first stop was by the equally turquoise Zerne Reservoir where we took a look at the steppe cloaking the rather arid hills. We found the strange-looking *Eremostachys molucceloides*. The pale lime bracted *Hymenocrater bituminosus* had blue flowers. Large pale flowers of *Silene chlorifolia*

perched atop sticky stems. Orange-lined wands of creamy *Onobrychis atropatana* were a pleasant sight. There were *Onosmas*, *Astragalus latifolius* and Gillian found the white and blue-ish flowered *Delphinium albiflorum*, Ian the an unknown blue *Delphinium*. There were plenty of flowers on the yellow dogrose *Rosa hemisphaerica*. Several rather large Purple-shot Coppers were in the gullies along with Turkish Golden Copper and Algerian Fritillary.

We had gone only a short way when a wonderful show of *Iris paradoxa* stopped us. Right by the road was a fabulous group with the velvety falls and ink-lined standards looking perfect.

We continued on up to the Güzeldere Pass not stopping until we reached the top. Here we parked atop a ridge at around 2750m with amazing views all around. A nice level track took us along to a gully which for some at least led up to some snow patches. By the minibus the very dwarfed alpine flora was rather good with some nice cushions of *Androsace villosa*, some with flowers so thick that was all we could see. There were straw-coloured pom-poms of *Centaurea vanensis* and a most marvellous deep blue *Veronica*. *Bornmuellera cappadocica* made nice cushions. Walking to the snow we passed the strange inflated seed heads of *Bellevallia rixii*. Once in the gully there was a nice range of plants. *Puschkinia scilloides* blazed ice-blue from the wet brown earth alongside *Gageas confusa* and *luteoides*.

Fine pink goblets of *Merendera raddeana* bloomed by the snow and on drier spots the ground was in places showered with the variable green and brownish-black tubby bells of *Fritillaria (crassifolia) kurdica*. Growing with the latter were some lovely buttercups including the almost fleshy-leave *polyrhizos* with distinctive bur-like fruiting heads and another buttercup with huge heads 3cm across on short stalks. Those that reached the snow were treated to a few fine *Tulipa koyuncii*, this very local tulip being only known from a few spots in the Van area. We found a few *Trollius ranunculinus* and some nice *Allium akaka* too.

Shore Larks were the main passerines. Overhead there were Long-legged Buzzards, Ravens and Richard photographed a Golden Eagle that sailed over. *Draba rosularis* flowered in the grasses, *Draba polytricha* on the rocks, these alongside *Gagea bulbifera*. Down by a stream grew a beguiling mix of *Primula auriculata*, brilliant blue *Gentiana verna* subspecies *pontica* and *Anemone narcissiflora*. James spotted Snowfinches. In the gully with the snowmelt plants was a superb Caucasian Vernal Copper and on the flowery ridge were Peak Whites. A Cape Hare sauntered away and James found a dead Père-David's Mole.

We descended a little to a side valley that produced sightings of the hope for male Bluethroat. The race here is '*magna*' with an unspotted shimmering blue throat. At least two males were seen and a female. We also had good views of Radde's Accentors, a Scarlet Rosefinch, Black-headed Buntings and the slightly odd local form of Whinchat. Twite were noted and the lovely '*bella*' form of Linnet too.

Now we headed downhill and eastwards, eventually reaching the farmed country to the south of Albayrak, just a few kilometres from the Iranian border. The views all around in the crystal clear mountain air were incredible. On the steppe next to the road we could already see the shining yellow heads of *Iris urumiensis*. This is a fabulous iris, the whole flower being yellow of differing shades, many two-tone, some pale and a goodly number a bright rich butter yellow, even some egg-yolk yellow. The lowering sun allowed some marvellous backlit photos. We reckoned there to be two to three thousand blooms in a few hundred metre stretch of

hillside, an absolutely fantastic sight. The wide-open landscapes allowed one to choose a background for those wide angle shots. A damp valley floor had many orchids and primulas and over by the river a swathe of an unknown red *Silene*.

Then it was back towards Van, stopping en route for backlit and forelit photos of the rather mythical-looking Hoşap Castle. We went up to look at the impressive gate now sitting pretty in a fully restored set of walls.

Day 12 May 30th Erçek Lake

We set off at nine, on to the road to Iran due east of Van. After ten kilometres or so Erçek Lake appeared, a large lake, set even higher than Van at 1900m and surrounded by hill or mountainous steppe, a wide open and very beautiful sparsely inhabited landscape. Our first stop was by a small marsh for many years now home to a very few pairs of White-headed Ducks. Sure enough these were there, today we saw at least nine birds. We watched the almost comical males displaying, their bodies swelling as they put their heads down, swollen blue bills pushed out and charge There were also a few Pochard, a female Red-crested Pochard and there was a Marsh Harrier too. There were Moustached and Paddyfield Warblers, Bearded Tits, Little Grebes, and many Marsh Frogs. Along the verge were some very showy *Crambes* and *Anchusas*.

Moving on we found ourselves on the wide flat valley floor east of the main lake. Here the damp, slightly salt-imbued steppe had a vast population of



the *Orchis pseudolaxiflora*. In places they grew thickly and there were very occasional white or strawberry milkshake forms. *Ornithogalum cuspidatum* was noted. Also the tiny water crowfoot *Ranunculus rionii*. And the showy Flowering Rush, *Butomus umbellatus*. Along the gravel levees we saw the first flowers of *Iris spuria* subspecies *musulmanica*. We actually made two visits here, the first interrupted by a sharp rain shower that came over. As the storm arrived a Hobby flew through. After we heard Quail and found a

Redshank's nest with four eggs.

Our lunch spot was close by a tower hide put up to overlook Erçek's marshes. We watched Black-winged Stilts, Redshank, Kentish Plovers and Avocets along the shore. There were a few Night Herons. There were lots of Bearded Tits, Moustached Warblers and Paddyfield Warblers in the reeds. A Water Rail was seen briefly. A Whiskered Tern sat upon the shore and a group of Black Terns flew through. There were also lots of Black-headed Wagtails about and a single female Citrine Wagtail was noted. In the distance we could see many gulls and around a hundred Greater Flamingos. Bee-eaters were noted almost throughout the day.

After lunch we continued our circumnavigation of the lake. The landscape became ever more beautiful partly helped by the showers changing to clear afternoon sun. The landscape became undulating with areas of arable land interspersed with natural steppe. There were craggy mountains here and there and occasional tranquil villages. At one point most of us were planning where to put our houses!

Larks were a feature this afternoon. Bimaculated Larks were common and Short-toed too, with the occasional Crested. We started to find *Onobrychis*, the representatives of this genus in this part of Turkey being exceptionally beautiful. There was road-lining *carduchorum*, delicate *sulphureum* subspecies *vanense*, lovely butter-yellow *galegiformis* and another lovely two-tone yellow species. There were some fine plants of *Glaucium grandiflorum*. Butterflies started to appear notably Small Bath White. We found one particular area of marly steppe that was covered in beautiful plants. Chief among them was probably the large almost shrubby *Salvia kronenburgii*. There was also *Acantholinum bracteatum*, *Linum flavum*, the impressive pompoms of *Klasea serratuloides*, and a rich assortment of *Astragalus* and *Aethionema*!

Those that joined me for the early morning trip to the Dönemeç Delta were in for a treat – documenting a rarely recorded breeding bird for Turkey! We arrived on the lake shore side of the delta and walked the near kilometre to the breeding site for White-tailed Plovers. We stopped to enjoy endless Bearded Tits, Moustached and Paddyfield Warblers as we went, all the while hearing Bitterns booming. Little Bitterns were heard as well. The White-tailed Plovers are a rarity indeed as there are few records, but even better, they appeared to be nesting! It was great to get such good views of these striking and easy to identify waders. Previous records of White-tailed Plover are few, though certainly nowadays annual. There are a few breeding records from the centre

and south of the country, though not the east. And was a Collared Pratincoles sitting on the dry sandy salty areas too. We headed to a little raised area where we could scan the land further along. There were White Storks, lots of Cattle Egrets, and amongst the vast numbers of Armenian Gulls. Dönemeç is a special place! There was even a single *Iris paradoxa*.

We stopped by a quarry where a small area of natural steppe held a most exquisite display of blooms. First up was a roadside mass of *Linaria kurdica*. These massed yellow blooms were quite a sight. Around it grew *Convolvulus linearis*, and lots of colourful *Astragaluses*. We found some bright red *Roemeria refracta* and then we found a large area splattered with *Glaucium grandiflorum*. Bimaculated, Crested, and Short-toed Larks were singing all around us.

We moved on to a dry rocky gorge. This sunny spot proved attractive to butterflies. Down in the dry gully by the bus were several blues, mostly Mazarine but also Chapman's Blue. There were Glanville Fritillaries and in one warm spot we saw Lesser Fiery Copper and the lovely Turkish Golden Copper. There were skippers too and our first Southern Comma posed for the cameras. Rock Sparrows were noisy on the rocky crags and there were at least two Crimson-winged Finches. A Western Rock

Nuthatch was seen, so too Grey-necked Bunting, and a very co-operative Chukar. Along the roadside was brilliant yellow *Hypericum scabrum* and yellow umbels too. Up the slope were various *Astragalus* and some very fine clumps of *Aethionema grandiflorum*. *Aethionema membranaceum* was also seen alongside little *Viola modesta* and impressive *Leopoldia atropatana*, as well as a pale lilac broomrape. Wonderful *Allium akaka* posed by the roadside and there were equally fine rock plant in pink silvery-foliaged *Centaurea karduchorum*.

Next was a stop to see the lovely *Potentilla lignosa* which this year was flowering in cascades over some rocky outcrops, an arresting sight. Meanwhile Dipper, Grey Wagtail and Common Sandpiper were being noted.

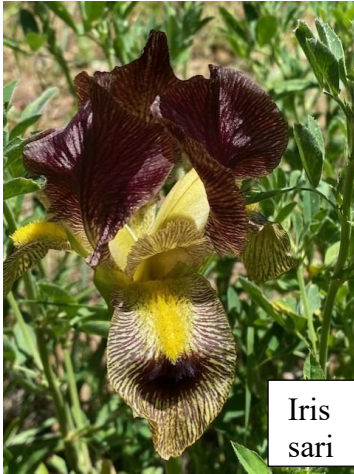

We visited a little village where the ferula dominated slopes below the village harboured an exquisite population of *Iris sari*. They were very variable. These were devoured by the iris photographers who moved from one to the other trying wide angles, close ups etc etc. Growing even more commonly here was the lovely *Astragalus halicacabus* with pale pink flowers, but more importantly, masses of inflated pink seedpods which in

places obscured the ground. Olivaceous Warblers sang from willows where we spotted Pontic Blues – these shimmered beautifully in the sun. There was an extraordinary variety of other Astragalus. Two *Helichrysums*, *pallasii* and *plicata*, were found as well as a lovely *Allium*, a *Hedysarum*, lots of *Geranium stepporum*, and *Valeriana sisymbriifolia*. A marshy area held some unusual plants such as *Alchemilla*, the giant *Trifolium longidenatum*, and the rare buttercup *Ranunculus strigosus*. Frog Orchids and *Gladiolus kotschyianus* were much enjoyed and growing with the latter was the unusual buttercup *Ranunculus strigosus*. Our picnic was enjoyed on the edge of the village. Some of the village kids appeared and were most pleased when Halil got out the Hobbies (little chocolate bars)!

The afternoon was spent exploring a little further down the valley towards Çatak. Here we descended into an area where first juniper became frequent on the hillsides before descending further into scrub dominated by *Celtis*. We stopped amid the former and took a look around. This was the place where many years previously I'd recorded Turkey's first Plain Leaf Warblers. None of course today, but we did see a couple of very nice male Ring Ouzels and some Red-fronted Serins. A star find here was the lovely Romanov's Copper, a wonder in orange and blue-green. The ones that Richard showed us visiting a *Daphne mucronata* bush were in exquisite condition. Down by the river hundreds of Mountain Small Whites mud-puddled.

Further down the valley we stopped where a small river came cascading out of the cliffs. A rather lovely spot. Plants of interest here were *Paronychia turcica*, *Stachys laetivirens*, and two *Salvias*, the reddish *Salvia trichoclada* and the very large-flowered *Salvia macrochlamys* with bright cerise and white blooms.

Our last stop was a little back up the valley where some villagers had made a large walnut grove and a few arable fields too. Chaffinches and European Nuthatches surprised us. A Persian Squirrel scurried across the track. We found our second vernal copper of the day, *Callimachus nesimachis*, the Caucasian Vernal Copper.

Day 14 June 5th

Our early morning birding trip took us to the Dönemeç Delta. Bitterns boomed and Savi's Warblers reeled as we took a few moments to overlook the marsh. Birds were flying everywhere. We took a walk with marshes and reed beds around us. We were soon getting ourselves familiarized with both the songs and the appearance of an impressive suite of *Acrocephalus* warblers. Commonest were Moustached and Paddyfield. There were also Reed and Great Reed. Black-headed Yellow Wagtails were common.

Water Rails called. Bearded Tits were everywhere. We headed down to the 'coast'. Here we got our feet both wet and muddy! But we enjoyed – there were plenty of White Storks, Little Egrets, Purple Herons and the like. A group of Gull-billed Terns lounged on some bare mud. Red-crested Pochard were frequent in the water and we saw Garganey and Ruddy Shelduck too. There were both Black-headed Gulls and Slender-billed Gulls joining the throng. A Ruff was seen and two Wood Sandpipers.

We returned to Dönemeç Delta after breakfast as we didn't need to be at the airport until almost lunchtime. The morning was spent amongst the rich range of birds that call this amazing place home – much the same species were seen as in the morning though always there were new ones. This morning there were Whiskered Terns. And some of us made it far enough along to see the White-tailed Plovers. An early lunch picnic was taken and then we were off to the airport to start our journeys home!

Greentours tour to Lake Van 2025

An alternative tour report!! by Hilary Little (With apologies to J. Milton Hayes)

There's a big blue lake in Turkey in the east close to Iran.
And we travelled there with Greentours on a trip.
In Istanbul we gathered before flying to Lake Van
And then driving up to Doğubeyazıt!

Our first journey started well and we saw iris by the score,
The most lovely 'barnumae' with purple blooms.
There were orchids too and primulas before we stopped for lunch
At a stunning waterfall with shady rooms.

Some dined on saç kavurma, whilst others ate the river trout,
And best of all the freshly-made ice-cream!
In a nearby little orchard we found scarlet Phelypaea,
Though to reach it, Ozan helped me cross a stream.

On a hillside was an iris I had longed to see for years,
'iberica' with beautiful brown falls,
And upright, pure white standards marked with narrow, lilac veins
Into view came Ararat, which capped it all!

At the Hotel Paraşut, the breakfasts were divine repasts.
In the grounds they'd built a Noah's Ark from wood,
Which almost seemed to nestle down in Ararat's twin peaks,
Depending where the picture-taker stood.

In the morning all the twitchers set off early to spot birds,
While the rest of us explored a marshy bog,
As Jennifer recounted long ancestral family tales,
And Ozan sat in a corner on a log!

Ishak Paşa's lonely palace was built high upon a hill,
Ozan talked about the history of the site,
We wandered through the ruins of the courtyards and the halls,
Richly patterned, full of interest and light.

From that site it was a steep climb to the screes and cliffs above
On which, Ian said, the scarlet tulip grew,
Having traversed high across the hill, both Jen and I then saw
Gypsophila domes and alliums purple-blue.

Next day we drove to Ahlat and stopped near a mosque to search
For orchids thriving near to lava flows.
Where Pedicularis species and a sempervivum bloomed,
And Bellevalia paradoxa also grows.

Tasty picnic food was eaten by the northern shore of Van,
Huge banks of reeds obscured the distant view,
Flamingoes stalked the shallows, though they quickly moved away
There were spoonbills, egrets, herons, ibis too.

Close to Ahlat was a woodland where the owner's cows did roam,
Stately orchids massing tall within arms reach.
Our old hotel at Ahlat graced the western shore of Van,
And the waves at night lapped softly on the beach.

In Nemrut Dağ's high crater we crossed boulder fields and scrub,
Finding choice new plants deep down amongst the grit.
There was *Rindera lanata* and a spurge with deep red bracts,
Puschkinia scilloides, and a Frit.

By the crater lake's calm waters we then ate our lunch in peace,
And found yellow, Georgian orchids in the trees.
Returning up along the road, we made repairs with stones.
Pulsatillas at the top swayed in the breeze.

The Seljuk tombs of Ahlat were all bathed in evening light,
As we wandered round the ancient rust red stones
Carved from basalt with quite intricate motifs upon the sides,
Four thousand years, a resting place for bones.

From Ahlat's Bay we headed south, the Bitlis circuit to complete,
The meadows with gold buttercups shone bright.
A coach of Turkish ladies stopped to see the waterfall,
Taking pictures of this photogenic sight.

From there a rocky gorge so deep was home to many flowers
Ozan photographed one for me way up high
Campanula reuterana was this lovely plant's real name,
There were yellow roses too and butterflies.

Then a silver-washed fritillary and a cream-spot tiger moth
Both fluttered by our happy group that day,
Along with many sorts of blues and clouded yellows too,
Drinking water from small pools in muddy clay.

Consolidated layers of grey volcanic ash and grit,
Had hardened into bands where swallows bored
Their nesting holes. Safe home to flocks of sand-martins and chicks,
These strata Suphan's violence now record.

Well, we found the Komper's Orchid and a nice bee orchid too,
Leopoldia comosa and a thistle.
As we crossed a grassy meadow a small herd of cows came down,
To which we were alerted by a whistle!

As we travelled on to Van, we saw the vegetation change,
From wooded hills to slopes so smooth and bare,
The underlying rock was strange, Earth's mantle not Earth's crust,
An ophiolite, said Hilary, it's quite rare.

Our last hotel was sumptuous, the Hilton Doubletree,
The breakfast bar the best in all of Van,
But Austin's leg turned purple and his knee was swollen too
To the hospital he travelled with Ozan.

The hospital was busy but in under two short hours,
He'd seen a doctor, had x-rays and ultrasound,
Strong pills to fight infection, gels and creams and jabs for pain
With bandages his ankle had been bound.

The Isle of Akdamar lay near to the southern shore of Van,
Ian organised a boat trip on the lake.
We visited its monastery, explored its rocky core,
